Esteemed Patrons, well-wishers, friends and book-lovers,

The youth library movement which started in a little one-room in Tezu in May 2007 has completed 12 memorable years of reaching out to the youth and adults of eastern Arunachal and upper Assam. Today it has indeed set bench marks in promoting reading habits and has produced several reader-activists who have benefited themselves in life – academically and personally – having spent a part of their energies in the service of the community, spreading the joy of reading. And we are profoundly grateful to our hundreds of patrons, volunteers and well-wishers, who have earnestly and spiritedly been supporting the library Network in scores of ways to achieve this.

The year 2018-19 began with a challenge before us: an acute need for new volunteers. We are glad that quite a few new members –college students too - have emerged. With their involvement, the Network could organise during the year a range of activities that promote our motto 'spread the joy of reading' and our maxim, "when readers cannot come to books, books must go to readers". The Network was also a part of two prestigious programmes supported by the state Govt:

- i) The Arunachal Literary & Art Festival (ALAF), Itanagar Aug 2018. We are profoundly thankful to the ALAF organisers for inviting us to coordinate the Book exhibition section of the Festival, which saw the active participation of Tulika Books, Chennai, Kalpavriksh, Pune, Karadi Tales, Chennai & TERI Books New Delhi.
- ii) **The Joy of Reading Festival, Roing**, Dec 2018 organised by the Lower Dibang Valley District Admn. Here too the book exhibition was organised by the Lohit libraries, with Ashok Leyland, Guwahati graciously adding a "Knowledge on Wheels" -- a bus that took the exhibition to Tezu and Dambuk towns. We are deeply grateful to the Ashok Leyland Guwahati for readily joining hands in our reading promotion programmes.

In addition, we could organise exhibitions at 8 other venues and occasions in Lohit and L/ Dibang Valley. We are grateful to TERI, (GOI), New Delhi, Tulika, Chennai, Eklavya, Bhopal, Kalpavriksh, Pune, NBT India, Guwahati, Ektaara, Bhopal, RIWATCH, Roing & Sri Ramakrishna Math, Chennai for extending us generous support.

Another milestone has been the bringing out the 2nd edition of our popular anthology "Mishmi Land Musings" edited by the renowned author Arup Kumar Dutta. We are deeply grateful to the Director, Public Libraries & Secretary, Tourism of the Govt of Arunachal Pradesh for generously sponsoring our book. The book has been won warm appreciation from hundreds of readers across the country.



We had, in our last year's report, made a strong appeal for '*reading-mentors*' - from our own neighbourhood itself - to come forward to provide "Adult Time" as models for our reading-deprived youth.

Interestingly the draft National Education Policy 2019 stresses these very points. To quote, "If every literate member of the community could commit to teaching one student/person how to read, it could change the country's (learning) landscape very quickly." The Policy clarifies 'why': "At the current time, there is a severe learning crisis in India, where children (in primary schools) are failing to attain even basic skills such as foundational literacy; and in general, the reading, writing and speaking of languages..."

Hence we would appeal once again to the educated citizens of Arunachal to spare a few hours every month to guide the youth in their neighbourhood.
