First Malayalam book on Folktales of Arunachal published:

In a very memorable function, H.E Governor of



Arunachal Pradesh, Gen (retd) J.J. Singh, released, on Jan 21, 2012, the first ever book by a Lohit Youth Library activist, titled "Arunachal Natodi-

kkathakal" at Raj Bhavan, in the presence of a galaxy of Arunachali elites, intellectuals, educationists and patrons of Lohit Youth Library Movement.

The book is by Sathyanarayanan Mundayoor, with artwork by Ms Indirm Boo, a Delhi-based artist from Tezu. Published by the reputed group, Mathrubhumi, it is the first of its kind for young people in Malayalam and has since received warm appreciations from many corners.

National Youth Day Contests Jan 12, 2012: The event, organized by the Lohit Youth Libraries drew considerable enthusiastic responses from the students of Tezu and Wakro. At Tezu, a Book reading contest saw students of middle-schools around the town keenly participating. At Wakro, the audience sat thrilled, as the participants spun yarns of fiction, in the creative story-telling contests in English and Mishmi languages. Story-writing contests also brought forth some excellent pieces, two of which received high commendations from a very senior and respected intellectual of Chennai.

2nd British Council Int. Conference on English Language Teaching & Development, Hyderabad: For the second successive year Lohit Youth Libraries attended the conference, this time by Ms. P. World Book Day Celebrations in Wakro:

The World Book Day, which marks the birthday of William Shakespeare, was celebrated for the second year in succession in Wakro circle by the vacation mini-libraries, named "Reading Brigades" at Medo, Hooking, Manyuliang, Lamliang, Pukhuri and Kanjang. The programmes were presented by library reader-activists and the village-children trained by them.

The major celebrations was held at Medo village at the Gyan Sarovar School, where the audience numbering more than 150 members attended. The Reading brigades of Hooking (under Ms. Rubila), Pomliang (Ms. Bomanlu) and Manyulaing (Ms. Mosamlu) and APNE Library Wakro (Ms. Kesilu) conducted the events, under the guidance of Mrs.

Bihem Lap, advisor, Medo Library. Addressing the packed gathering, Dr. S. Nayil, SMO, Chongkham and Patron, APNE Library lauded the efforts of the Reading Brigades and hoped more parents would encourage their children to do wide reading.
